





They include genome sequencing to track new variants, booster shots, improved tracing programme

BUDGET shots or multi-year vaccination programmes are among the new measures that the government will take in the fight against Covid-19.

The other efforts included whole genome sequencing by the Institute for Medical Research to detect the presence and spread of new variants in the country, as well as improving the development of the Find, Test, Trace, Isolate and Support programme on an end-to-end basis.

Finance Minister Tengku Dato' Sri Zaid Ibrahim said five measures, including the setting up of a dedicated Covid-19 call centre, would be implemented



ed to galvanise the nation's healthcare system amid the pandemic.

"Without a doubt, Covid-19 has shown that public healthcare is an important foundation to enable other sectors to operate. In such, we will not compromise on what is required to place our public healthcare at the heart of our recovery plan," he said.

He said the economic initiatives undertaken by the government since March last year have formed a strong basis for the country's recovery.

KUALA LUMPUR: National Recovery Council (NRC) chairman Tan Sri Muhyiddin Yassin is confident optimistic that with the "whole of nation" approach, 2022 will be the year of Malaysia's recovery, in line with the government's target.

He said the economic initiatives undertaken by the government since March last year have formed a strong basis for the country's recovery.

"In charting the recovery process, the government through the National Recovery Plan, has found ways to strengthen Malaysia's public healthcare system and its

Medical tourism green bubble can boost country's income

KUALA LUMPUR: Association of Private Hospitals of Malaysia (APHM) is asking the government to consider creating a green bubble to attract tourists which could boost the country's income while setting the path to recovery.

President Dr Rajesh Singh said medical tourism had logged more than RM1 billion in revenue in 2019 and was expected to generate more in 2020 before the pandemic hit.

"We find the medical tourism would be the best way of starting tourism because it is safe and easily regulated."

"With the cooperation of the Malaysian Healthcare Tourism Council, we will be able to set up a green bubble to get medical tourists from around the world that would be one of our major sources of income," he said during a virtual National Recovery Summit yesterday.

He said the ministry had to facilitate the movement of medical tourists who might be required to quarantine upon arrival at the hospital.

Currently, the requirements for medical tourists during a pandemic are "very strict" and they may not even be allowed

to travel which makes the private doctors here to seek treatment in the country. He said:

"We hope medical tourism will help solve the problem of the problem."

The APMH president had flagged more than RM100 million in revenue from medical tourism in 2019 and was expecting a similar amount this year.

"We think that by increasing the number of patients that would need intensive care units, the occupancy of intensive care units (ICUs) will go up in private hospitals."

"ICU rates are the key response and the best way for us to provide a sustainable response to Covid-19 in an accessible primary care to prevent these cases from

degenerating and sending ICU treatments."

"Interventions in primary care does not only mean vaccines but it also includes contact tracing," he said.

Meanwhile, Deputy Health DG Datuk Dr Hishamah Shah Mohd Ibrahim said the ministry was well aware of the situation and had taken steps to review medical needs such as ICU beds to accommodate patients such as COVID-19.

He said the Health Ministry is currently looking at increasing the ICU and hospital beds to meet the demand of the private hospitals for non-Covid cases.

However, he acknowledged the need for more management of hospitals which is a crucial aspect in containing the pandemic.

"Because if it is not early detection but also the right support staff who are created at the moment."

"Even if we build hospitals, we do not have the number of nurses and staff that we need."

"In the bigger picture, we need to meet up the capacity of the healthcare system in Sabah and Sarawak. The pandemic shows that we lack in that area and we are taking steps to prevent these cases from

occurring again."

"We are seeing more cases in

the younger population. This is something we need to do in the coming months," he said.

Dr Hishamah Shah was speaking at a virtual National Recovery Summit dialogue titled "Working Together To Achieve The National Recovery Plan".

Dr Hishamah Shah also believed that the issue of digital vaccination certificates should be looked into to ensure the ease of travelling abroad.

"We must address how we can collaborate with our foreign counterparts so that our vaccination certificate will be accepted in other countries as well."

Dr Hishamah Shah said as the nation progressively moved to-






The Global Tax Reform and Its Implication on Malaysia

A key development emerging from the G7 Finance Ministers meeting which took place on 5th June 2021 was a communiqué centred on principal design elements for international tax reform for the Organisation for Economic Co-operation Development's (OECD) countries. The purpose of this move is to gain higher tax revenues by addressing the long-standing issue of multinational corporations taking advantage of loopholes found in tax systems. The communiqué proposes the introduction of two pillars to reshape the global tax system by addressing the digital economy and to ensure that companies pay taxes where they operate
